6 National Register Listings

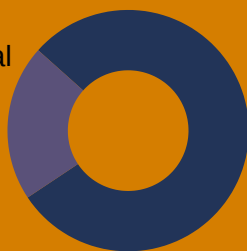
The National Register in Louisiana boasts over 50,000 contributing properties listed statewide. This year we finalized 6 listings (182 buildings and 1 district boundary increase). The National Register and Tax Credit Programs are tremendous tools that work together to revitalize historic buildings across our state.



In Jackson Parish, the John S. Hunt and Martha McGill Stewart House was listed under Criterion B for its association with the founders of the Hodge Lumber Mill.

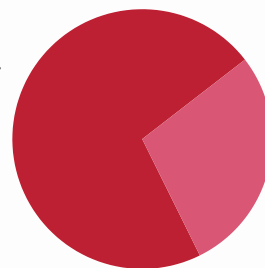

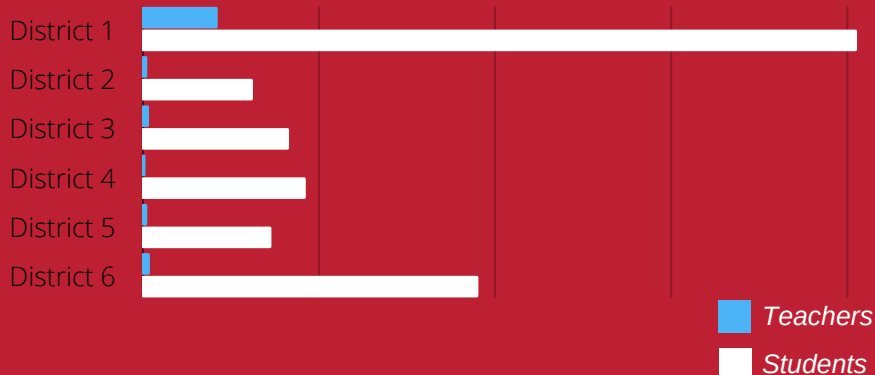

This year, **over 100 teachers** introduced **over 1,800 students** to the field of archaeology through classroom teaching kits and presentations.

The Division of Archaeology engaged **over 18,300 people** of all ages through public engagement!
